
# Background

Established on September 9, 1915, the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH) was founded by the "Father of Black History," Dr. Carter G. Woodson. ASALH is an organization that has continued Dr. Woodson's legacy by providing resources, information, and guidance to the community. Thus, for over 100 years, ASALH's mission as the premier, Black Heritage society has been to promote and disseminate African American History.





#### A Scholar-Servant

Dr. Carter G. Woodson understood that all segments and walks of life who comprise our country's population needed access to the histories of Black America. To ensure that every segment of the U.S. population had access to this information, he launched The Journal of *Negro History*, a scholarly publication in 1916. Twenty years later he began publishing The Negro History *Bulletin* for the general public and non-academic audiences. His most widely read and acclaimed scholarship, however, is the 1933 study on The Mis-Education of the *Negro.* Still in print and owned by the ASALH, students, teachers, parents, history enthusiasts, and learners of all ages can all still experience the "truth to power" of Dr. Woodson's premier text.

In 1926, Dr. Woodson initiated the annual observance of "Negro History Week," a celebration which coincided with the birthdays of Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln. In 1976, President Carter extended it to include the entire month of February; and, today, **Black History Month garners** support throughout the country as people of all ethnic and social backgrounds discuss our achievements and diverse, Black experiences. Consequently, The ASALH views the promotion of Black History Month as one of its most important components in advancing Dr. Woodson's legacy.
